

We are not in Kansas anymore Toto!



When she awoke, Dorothy was amazed to find herself zoomed up in a tornado and not back home in Kansas. I wonder if she would recognise what is happening today.

Everything has changed and what has happened to schools throughout the world is unique. Even during the Second World War children still went to school.

One thing we do know as school governors is how hard the staff have been working to ensure children could get back in, while protecting staff from getting ill themselves. Unlike Dorothy and her pals, social distancing has been a big challenge for schools, and this has meant lots of moving furniture around and setting up signs so that everyone is able to move around safely.

Governors have had to adapt too, as we have still had responsibility for setting and agreeing the strategic direction of the school. For the schools that I am involved with, everyone has got to grips with using Zoom or an alternative known as Microsoft Teams. Attendance at these virtual meetings has been better than normal. There has been the additional advantage of being able to quickly phone anyone missing to see if they are OK, and often they are then able to quickly join in.

Careful chairing has been more important than normal to ensure that everyone can contribute. When we have had lots of participants, governors have had to turn off their video to ensure that everyone can join. Too many people joining means that it eats up the internet bandwidth and either does not work or is very slow. We have all been learning new skills like muting our own output so that, interesting as it might be, everyone does not pick up on the business of what is going on in our homes.

King Charles the Martyr Church and the Spencer Davis Group

Colin Davies recalls historical links of both to Borough Way, Potters Bar.

King Charles the Martyr Church

My wife and I tied the knot in 1956, and for the first year we rented accommodation in North London while we searched for a property to call our first real home. One Saturday morning we decided to jump on a steam train at Finsbury Park station and got off at the first stop going north ~ which happened to be Potters Bar, a town which we had never previously visited. We searched around and quickly found a suitable three-bed Tudor-style semi in Borough Way for which we agreed to pay the enormous sum of £2,400.

After living in Borough Way for a while we discovered an interesting article in the local library about the beginnings of Church of King Charles the Martyr, less than a mile away, which was in the process of being built just before WWII. It seems that when the church and church hall were being built, the incumbent church cleric at the time lived at our address (as a temporary "vicarage"?) and that our living room had been used for church services with the detached garage being used as provisional accommodation for children's Sunday School. Those were the days when planning rules would probably not have permitted such temporary use! (We still wonder whether our semi-detached in Borough Way had ever been consecrated for religious services ~ or indeed was it really necessary? If so, has it ever been de-consecrated?).

Consecrated or not, in 1964, some years after moving in, I decided to demolish the rather flimsy prefabricated detached garage and re-build with brick walls. Our three-year-old daughter, as a 'bricklayer's mate', helped to sort out the bricks. It kept her occupied, supplying me with bricks, but we would not get away with such child-labour these days ~ albeit voluntary! After almost sixty years, the garage is still standing but our daughter never became a bricklayer.





Spencer Davis Group

In 1965 we decided to move house to be more convenient for Little Heath School attended by our two children. Having found a suitable property, we put our house on the market in November and (such was the domestic property market at the time) it was sold within a couple of days. When I got home from work one evening my wife said "I've sold our house to a young gentleman from Birmingham by the name of Spencer Davis." Neither of us realised it at the time, but he was an up-and-coming rock musician who had formed the successful Spencer Davis Group in 1963. He had viewed our home for a matter of minutes that afternoon and decided to buy on the spot, and he offered the asking price without haggling. He used the stage name Davis, but he was born in Swansea, and his Welsh family name was actually Davies ~ but no relation to us. In the run up to Christmas 1965 the Spencer Davis Group toppled the Beatles from No.1 in the charts, with his song Keep on Running which, after over fifty-five years, we still keep on hearing from time to time. He was congratulated by the Beatles for beating them to No.1 and the Spencer Davis Group went on to have many more successful chart hits over the years.

As Christmas 1965 approached we had two urgent property transactions on our hands: the sale of our semi at Borough Way and the simultaneous purchase of a house in Little Heath. We were anxious to get all the official documents for both properties signed and sealed quickly before the offices of our conveyancing solicitor closed for a couple of weeks over the festive season, as we had planned to move during the first week of 1966. However, Spencer Davis was nowhere to be found for his signature on the Borough Way documents as he had gone into hiding without trace, hounded by the BBC and music press journalists. Eventually we found him to sign all documents with his real birth name Spencer David Nelson Davies. So, with all paperwork cleared for both properties, one Davies family moved out of Borough Way and the other Davies family moved in a week later than planned in January 1966.

I don't know how long the new Davis (Davies) family lived in Borough Way, but it could not have been more than about four years as the family moved to America in 1970. The Spencer Davis Group had several successful hits in the charts, and after he moved to America the group continued to have even more chart successes. He lived on Catalina Island off the coast of California and died on 19th October 2020 at the age of 81.

The role of a Celebrant

We have heard so much in recent months about families who have faced even greater adversities when losing a loved one due to COVID-19. With the restrictions in place for funeral services, on travel, the limitation of numbers and need for shielding, just some of the difficulties that we couldn't have foreseen a year ago, I would like to try and allay fears and anxieties and to provide reassurance. Celebrants will work with you to create lasting memories and provide comfort and strength in years to come as you pay your final respects to your loved one.

A celebrant is often asked to officiate at a funeral ceremony, usually when the family have no connection with a place of worship. Celebrants are trained and many belong to a professional body. They are able to perform both humanist services and those where some religious element is desired.

Time is taken with the family prior to the service to ensure that their loved one's character can radiate throughout all that takes place. Some families like to take a prominent part in the service, others would like the celebrant to read the eulogy and play a more active part.

All celebrants will have worked hard during this pandemic to try, where possible, to overcome the obstacles that the restrictions have created. Family members who are unable to attend can write a tribute that can be read for them, thus allowing them to be part of the service. Webcam can allow those who are unable to attend to be part of the service albeit virtually.

May we all be together again in 2021." The Society has already planned a full programme of on-line events until April and will review how things develop after that. Last year was topped-off by the Society having a double page spread feature in a December issue of *Amateur Photographer* magazine.

To ensure our parks and open spaces remain a haven for residents, work is starting to tackle moth pests across the borough.

The Forestry Commission is undertaking surveillance of some of Hertsmere's oak trees between February and March to investigate outlying Oak Processionary Moth (OPM) reports from members of the public. The contractors will be wearing hi-vis Forestry Commission vests and will carry a Plant Health Authority Card at all times when surveying. Trees identified as having an OPM infestation will be sprayed with an orange ring.

The Oak Processionary Moth caterpillar and their nest can cause itchy rashes, eye irritations and, in severe cases, breathing difficulties in people and pets. The moth was first reported in three council-owned sites across the borough in May 2020. Since then, we have surveyed over 1,350 Oak trees across Hertsmere's parks and open spaces and identified 48 trees across 16 council sites as having Oak Processionary Moth nests.

During July 2020 contractors, wearing protective clothing, removed and safely disposed of nests and caterpillars across our parks.

We installed signs in parks where the Oak Processionary Moth had been identified to warn park users to be vigilant. Our advice remains 'spot it, avoid it, report it'.

The greatest risk period is May to July when the caterpillars emerge and feed before pupating into adult moths, but nests, even old ones, should not be touched at any time. The nests are

typically dome or teardrop-shaped, ranging in size from a ping-pong ball to as large as a rucksack. They are white when fresh, but soon become discoloured and brown. The caterpillars have black heads and bodies covered in long white hairs and are easily recognised by a distinctive habit of crawling in large groups, nose-to-tail forming long lines on or around oak trees.



If you see any Oak Processionary nests or caterpillars in a council park you should report them immediately on **020 8207 2277** or email **customer.services@ hertsmere.gov.uk**.

If they are on a privately owned oak tree, report them to the Forestry Commission using the Tree Alert online pest reporting form, by calling 030 0067 442 or emailing opm@forestry.gsi.gov.uk.

Even COVID-19 can't keep a good band down!

It has been a hard time for everyone this year due to COVID-19 restrictions, but when regulations allowed you could hear the dulcet tones of the band floating out over Potters Bar! In September we rehearsed outdoors, and then in October when it got too cold outside, we went indoors but we still had all the windows and doors open for ventilation!



Luckily, our rehearsal hall was big enough for us to all sit 3 metres apart, and as added protection all the wind instruments used a bell end mask. This was a round piece of special muslin type material with elastic sewn in around the edge looking rather like a pudding basin cover over the end of the instrument. Even the flutes used a mask over the end where the air comes out and again over where the players blew across the hole that creates the sound! Amazingly the bell covers reduce the aerosols by over 90. Equally impressive is that any loss to the sound is marginal.

We will soon be back to rehearsals, probably with some precautions at first, but we practice in a Covid safe environment, and work strictly to our risk assessment. Zoom practices helped but there is nothing like the real thing.

Our senior Showband has retained most of our 55 players and will be working on their new programme for competitions and events coming up soon hopefully. Music selected for this specific programme is the theme music from *'The Incredibles'*, *'Take on Me'*

What is the EU settlement scheme?

When someone's right of residence in the UK is because they, or a relative, has EU, EEA or Swiss citizenship, they and their family should now apply to establish their status (via www.gov.uk/eusettledstatus).

Four million applications have been made so far and about half of them only received pre-settled status and may apply again. The deadline for applications is 30th June 2021 and the consequences of missing it can be serious.

Residents can try to get support on www.gov.uk/ assisted-digital-help-online-applications. If they lack access, or don't feel confident to use a computer or mobile device to complete it, they can phone the EU Settlement Resolution Centre on 0300 123 7379 or Citizens Advice on 0800 1148848.

I now volunteer for Settled (www.settled.org.uk), a charity that provides multi-lingual services to vulnerable citizens, for example the elderly, isolated, disabled, a child in care, with significant language or literacy problems, have mental health issues, do not have a permanent address, or are victims of domestic abuse or of human trafficking.




Things began on New Year's Day 2007 starting with my YouTube channel called PIGGIE58 which has a large mixture of Potters Bar films among other things. Some I filmed myself, of local events, some old newsreels including three of the Potters Bar Zeppelin from 1916, plus a few funny ones using "Green Screen" effects. The YouTube Channel has had over 10 million hits to date and growing.

Then on the 19th of June 2010, I created "Potters Bar – A Trip Down Memory Lane" a nostalgic memories and history group on Facebook. Members add old photographs of Potters Bar and its people and share their memories.

The group has grown over the years and has a membership of 5,894 members to date and rising. The group has become a lifeline in this pandemic, cheering people up in these difficult times. My life has changed too, the project has improved my mental health over the years. I've made new friends through it and have had many photos published in the local paper. The group reached its 10th birthday last year. Since then, sister groups have been created, such as South Mimms — A Trip Down Memory Lane, also there are groups for Little Heath & Brookmans Park, Northaw, Barnet, Finchley, Enfield, etc. The future for the group can only get better."

2020 was different to any other year that we can remember – of life in general and life at the Centre. It illustrated how dedicated our team of staff and volunteers are. Throughout times when most of the country are sitting safe behind their closed doors, the members of our team, whose age and health permits, are at the Centre ensuring that the animals are being given the best care possible.

As restrictive as the lockdowns and tier restrictions have been in 2020, more than ever before we have had the luxury of being able to spend quality time with the animals, and the results have been wonderful especially in our cattery. Our team of cattery staff and volunteers have worked nothing short of a miracle with a large group of 40 cats rescued from one property. We were told they were feral —

they were not. They were fearful but with loving and gentle handling over months during lockdown 1, they have responded amazingly to the extra attention given to them.

Of course, the dogs have benefitted hugely too from getting out of their kennels and walked by a small group of volunteers who have been with us all through the restrictions. There has been more time for play and games and interaction with others. Our miscellaneous section became specialists in hamster care after more than 20 were admitted during lockdown 1.

During the pandemic we have been overwhelmed with offers of homes for all the animals that we have been able to advertise for rehoming. We have had to carry out rehoming in a completely alien way, following guidelines and restrictions whilst keeping everyone safe. It has been a very challenging task, but one which has now been

perfected. Between March and December 2020 we rehomed nearly 400 animals of various species.

We do miss our supporters. Not having you pop in for a visit and dropping off treats for animals and staff has really been missed, but many have still had us in mind when shopping or passing, and we have been overwhelmed by the generosity of people dropping off socially distanced donations in the bins in front of our reception door.

Fundraising has obviously suffered hugely. Not being able to have our yearly Summer Funday or our Christmas Ball has been a massive loss and has lost us thousands in missed donations/income. This year hopefully, it will be a matter of all hands to the fundraising pump. To keep staff and volunteers safe, the Centre remains closed for public viewing throughout the pandemic.

Rotary GB&I's People of Action Polio Award

Brookmans Park Rotary Club Rotarian Barbara Middleton, a Potters Bar resident, was recently awarded the Rotary GB&I's People of Action Polio Award for her hard work and contributions towards the eradication of polio. This is an award given out annually to recognise significant and recent contributions to Rotary's humanitarian goal of eradicating polio from the world. Under current lockdown restrictions it wasn't possible to present Barbara with the award in person, so she received it virtually from Rotary GB&I Polio Champion Jannine Birtwistle, on behalf of Rotary GB&I, at a Rotary meeting in January 2021.

While Club President in 2013, Barbara travelled to Delhi for the first time to participate in a National Immunisation Day (NID) and helped to immunise 170 million children aged five and under. She later returned to India, travelling to Amritsar in 2017 and Kolkata in 2018, both times immunising under-fives. In 2019 she travelled to Bhiwadi with other British Rotarians, but the Indian Government postponed

the date of the NID after their arrival This caused Barbara to contact a local Rotarian Doctor, and with his assistance, all the British Rotarians were able to participate in the immunisation process at a local refugee camp instead.

Barbara has given talks about her experiences, had reports published in the Community News, and her photos have been used in Rotary 'End Polio' publicity and training materials. She is a passionate supporter of Polio eradication, and has been involved in many fundraising and awareness-raising events including planting crocuses and sponsored karaoke singing.



Brookmans Park Rotary - Santa rides again

One of the highlights at the end of 2020 for Brookmans Park Rotary Club was the ability to take their Christmas sleigh and Father Christmas out into the community.

WARNING as more residents lose money to scam Police calls

Hertfordshire residents have lost more than £80,000 during January to fraudsters posing as police officers. Nineteen residents have been targeted since the start of the year, with most of the victims being aged over 65.

The victims were contacted by callers posing as police officers, from either a landline or a mobile number, informing the intended victim that there has been fraudulent activity on their bank account. The bogus police officer then asks them to withdraw cash, or in some cases to buy expensive items, to hand over to a courier that is despatched to their address by the fraudster.

The offenders may also ask people to assist in the investigation by disclosing their bank details, including their account and PIN numbers.

The vital things to remember are that your bank and the police would:

- NEVER ask for your bank account details or PIN number over the phone, so do not disclose these to anyone, no matter who they claim to be.
- NEVER ask you to withdraw money and send it to them via a courier, taxi or by any other means.
- NEVER ask you to send your bank cards, or any other personal property, to them via courier, taxi or by any other means.

If you are not happy with a phone call, and are suspicious of the conversation you have with the caller, then please end the call and dial 101 or report online www.herts.police.uk/report.

Remember, when reporting a suspicious phone call to police, wait at least five minutes before attempting to make the call to ensure you're not reconnected to the offender.

Alternatively, use a mobile phone or test your landline by phoning a friend or relative first, to ensure you aren't still unwittingly connected to the offender. If you have concerns about your bank account, visit your local branch.

Your vote counts

On Thursday 6 May 2021 residents in Hertsmere will go to the polls to have their say on who represents them in Borehamwood Kenilworth ward in Hertsmere; South Mimms, Shenley and Aldenham Parish Councils; Hertfordsbire County Council and the Police and Crime Commissioner elections.

While local elections are not until May, we're already making plans to help you stay safe while casting your vote. There are a number of ways to have your say in the May elections — you can vote in a polling station, by post, or by appointing someone you trust to vote on your behalf, which is known as a proxy vote.

Sam Langford, Electoral Services Manager for Hertsmere Borough Council, said: "The elections later this year are very important. They're an opportunity to make your voice heard and have a say on who represents you on issues that directly affect day-to-day life. We're thinking about these elections now so that, however you choose to cast your vote in May, you can do so safely. We're putting arrangements in place to help you stay safe at the polling station; you can expect many of the measures you've become used to in shops and banks over recent months, such as hand sanitiser, floor markings and face masks. But you also have the option to apply to vote by post or by proxy." Ailsa Irvine, Director of Electoral Administration and Guidance at the Electoral Commission said: "The choice on how to vote at May's elections is yours — you can have your say in person, by post or by proxy.

"If you're thinking about voting by post, you can apply now. This will make sure your application is processed early, and your postal vote can be sent to you more quickly. It's easy to apply and you can find out how by visiting the Electoral Commission website.

"You need to be registered to vote in order to have a say at the elections – the easiest way to register is online at **www.gov.uk/register-to-vote**".



Apart from the Coal Tax marker on the Golf Course, previously written about, there are a couple of other items of interest.

Entry to the Old Golf Course is via a tunnel under the railway, from Cranborne Road at the end of the industrial estate. As people walk through the tunnel, they are surrounded by brickwork that is 170 plus years old. Bearing in mind that the golf course did not exist in the 1850s, the tunnel was built to allow access for farmers to land on the east side of the railway. It was also a means of re-routing the old drovers trail from Half Penny Bottom at the lower end of Furzefield Woods to the footpath crossing the old Golf Course, now part of the Hertfordshire Way. The tunnel itself is not particularly wide but quite high, probably to allow a loaded hay waggon easy access. The fine Victorian bricks are in quite good condition for their age showing little signs of wear, but of course they are not exposed to the elements. The tunnel entrances however have been heavily reinforced with steel piling added in the 1970s to support the high-speed trains that came with electrification.

Once on the path crossing the old golf course, running alongside the small brook and walking eastward, people will eventually come across a World War II pill box built in 1940/41. Hertsmere have fixed a blue notice to it denoting a building of historical interest. Unfortunately it has now been vandalised with graffiti, although the photograph was taken before that happened. Most walkers will be unaware that having reached this point from the tunnel they have already passed another pill box which sits close to the railway embankment, and is almost completely covered by undergrowth. Both were part of a national line of defences against German invasion. Perhaps when life is more normal Hertsmere will be able to clean up the pill box.

Rare bird faces local extinction

For over thirty years the Herts Bird Club has been supporting the last remaining Tree Sparrows in Hertfordshire at their surviving breeding colony in the Tyttenhanger Gravel Pits area that lies between London Colney and Colney Heath. Tree Sparrows are 'red listed' as birds of the greatest conservation concern and this colony is one of only a few remaining in the southeast of England.

Now they face a threat from housing development on the site that would seal their fate, and mean that Tree Sparrows become extinct as a breeding bird in Hertfordshire. As part of their new Local Plan, Hertsmere Borough Council is looking to adopt the Tyttenhanger site for development. Their Local Plan sets out how they will meet their housing targets for the next 15 years and 6,000 new homes are proposed for the site.

In response to the threat posed, not just to the Tree Sparrows, but to all the rich wildlife of the area, a Working Group has been set up by the Herts Bird Club. Working with members of the SE Herts RSPB group and the Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust, the group is working together to oppose the development plans and look at ways the site and its wildlife, in particular the Tree Sparrows, can be saved.

As the development proposals are set to be adopted this spring, your support would be very welcome in helping save our Tree Sparrows and Tyttenhanger Gravel Pits as a great site for wildlife. The Church of King Charles the Martyr in Potters Bar

Celebrates 80 years since its dedication in 1941.

Most churches are named after saints but the church building on the new estate at the edge of the ever-expanding town of Potters Bar in 1941, was named after Charles, King and Martyr.

On Saturday 25 November 1939, the Foundation Stone was blessed by the Bishop of Willesden and laid by The Reverend T. Basil Woodd, a descendant of Captain Basil Woodd, who was a Gentleman-at-Arms to King Charles I, and who was with him on the scaffold and received his Garter just before his beheading.

The Consecration of the Church was to have been held in 1940, but the War and problems with the shortage of materials delayed this and it was not until 12 July 1941 that the Consecration by the Bishop of London took place.

The Service paper has a note to the effect that: "should an Air Raid Warning sound during the Service, there will be a short interval during which those who wish to go home or to the public shelter should reverently leave the Church. The Service will then proceed".

The history of this 'new' church with its unusual dedication will be celebrated over the weekend of Saturday 10th and Sunday 11th July 2021 as it celebrates the 80th anniversary of its consecration.

On Saturday 10th we hope to host a Family Fun-Day, organised by our community café with displays and information about the church and those who use our halls. On Sunday 11th we will be joined by Bishop Michael of Hertford to celebrate a Eucharist service, giving thanks for the work and dedication of those who have worshipped here over the years.
