Aircraft Museum Reopens



The unique de Havilland Aircraft Museum at historic Salisbury Hall, London Colney, is preparing to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the maiden flight of the aircraft which led to its formation – the Second World War 'wooden wonder' Mosquito fighter bomber.

On Sunday 1st March the museum will reopen its gates to visitors after its winter break.

It was the acquisition of the Prototype Mosquito by Hall owner, the late Walter Goldsmith, and his desire to preserve both this aircraft and the enormous contribution that Hatfield-based de Havilland Aircraft Company made to British aviation, that led to the acquisition of more than 20 types of de Havilland aircraft now on view to the public.

As well as the Prototype, visitors will be able to inspect two more Mosquitoes, making the museum's collection the largest of any aviation museum in the world. Look inside the sole surviving fuselage with "square windows" of the original de Havilland Comet 1 jet airliner, and other military and civil aircraft spanning some six decades. There is also a selection of jet engines designed by de Havilland, and several special displays.

Barracudas

Barracudas can be found anywhere from the Atlantic to the Indian Ocean, via the Mediterranean, the Caribbean... and Furzefield Leisure Centre, Potters Bar.

The Barracuda Swimming Club, run by a small but dedicated group of volunteers, has been helping people of all ages and disabilities to become confident in the water for around 40 years.

Like any other voluntary organisation, more helpers are always needed, particularly given that much of the swimming instruction is one-to-one. I became aware of Barracudas only a few months ago when my mother, Veronica, decided to get involved.

"I heard that the club needed more people and I thought it would be lovely to help in any way, even if it meant giving up just an hour a week."

A retired nursery school teacher, Veronica admits that her experience of working with very young children, some of whom were autistic, did give her more confidence. However, many of the Barracudas are already good swimmers and just need guidance and support.

"My one worry was that I wouldn't be physically strong enough in the water, but it wasn't a problem at all," Veronica, who gravitates towards the petite section of a clothes shop, explains.

"I'm very much enjoying it and it's very rewarding to know that my small contribution is helping those who are less able than myself."

Even a small amount of local publicity can make a difference. Since our last article about the club, the Barracudas have been joined by three new helpers and have welcomed five new swimmers. Chief instructor Ian Goldsworthy said: "Three years ago we had an average of 10 swimmers in the water on a Sunday morning. Now we normally have 30–40 swimmers plus helpers."

The Barracudas club is run on Sundays, 11.30am—12.30pm. New members and helpers are welcome. More information is available from www.pottersbar.org/barracudaswimmingclub/index.htm. Kimberley Swift

Parking at Barnet Hospital

In the last issue a brief summary of the revised arrangements for Blue Badge parking at Barnet Hospital was included. A leaflet has recently been published by the Royal Free London NHS Foundation Trust, and fuller details regarding the new system, using an automatic number recognition camera, are shown below:

General Parking – Patients and Visitors

Motorists are required to enter their full vehicle registration number into the payment machine when purchasing parking time. This must be done on arrival and if you exceed the amount of time purchased you can pay for additional time before you leave or until midnight on the day. You can purchase parking time from any machine by cash or card or by phone with code 84254 or **0330 400 7275**. You can also text REG and your number plate to **65565** or online at **www.paybyphone.co.uk**. *Charges*: 0–1 hour £2, 1–3 hours £3, 3–4 hours £4, 4–6 hours £7, 6–24 hours £10.

Blue Badge Holders

Blue badge holders are entitled to 4 hours free parking. Normal tariffs apply thereafter. You can park in the marked disabled bays or, if these are full, use visitor and patient areas. It is no longer necessary to display your blue badge in the car. Instead, blue badge holders must register the vehicle they have travelled in at the main reception of the hospital to ensure that the vehicle does not receive a parking notice charge during their time at the hospital. Such registration is required only once per vehicle so that regular visitors do not have to repeat this process and you may register more than one vehicle. There are also registration terminals at main reception and at A&E, if you are parking out of hours. Further information is available on the signs placed around the car park. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact rf-tr.carparkingbcf@nhs.net or speak to a member of staff at the main reception, open 8am—8pm daily.

Have you been to see the improved facilities at Oakmere library? Everyone can use this valuable community resource for studying, information and leisure. The new layout includes 6 computers for public use and designated Wi-Fi areas for adults and children. The children's area is much enhanced and hosts a toddler tales session on Monday afternoon and baby rhyme time on Wednesday morning. Other services on offer include one-to-one computer taster sessions and a home delivery service for anyone who is housebound, has a disability or cares for someone at home and is unable to reach the library.

When you visit the library you can borrow up to 12 items, read a newspaper or magazine and find information. If you would like to borrow items or use the online services you will need to sign up and become a library member. Membership is free. Oakmere library is located behind the recently built Elms surgeries in the High Street. Opening hours are shown on the back page of the *Community News*.



Mount Grace

Education is about more than academic learning for Sixth Form students at Mount Grace School. For two pupils in particular, Kerri Brennock and Kathryn Simpson, it is a chance to learn vital life skills in a unique environment, and one not to be missed in spite of its pressures.

In her article below, Kerri writes about the opportunity Sixth Form or college presents for students to mature into a wider society.

Education, like almost every other area of our society, has evolved in leaps and bounds in recent years. Being a student in today's society involves the utmost dedication; this in turn builds up character and strengthens independence. Our education system is one that teaches us discipline, creativity and to apply our intelligence. However, if you are unable to reach your peak and have the knowledge and understanding of what you are riveted by, it can prove to be difficult.

"Everybody is a genius but if you judge a fish by its ability to climb a tree it will live its whole life believing that it is stupid."

Ultimately the students of today's society are not given enough credit. We are put under immense pressure and are expected to be able to balance the workload of at least 3 academic subjects. As a student of Mount Grace School I understand the diverse needs of every student. School years are looked upon as the most crucial years of our lives. Being part of a Sixth Form gives you the opportunity to prove academic dedication and strengthen skills of independent learning. Students are treated with due respect and responsibility, with teachers on band both inside and outside of school.

In hindsight, sometimes students must realise that part of the struggle to connect with A Levels is up to them. Getting as much as you can out of your education involves all aspects of Sixth Form life; academic, social and transformational. I say transformational because Sixth Form has the potential to be the greatest transformative period in one's life. Getting a firm hold on this concept is important. 

Without the overwhelming dedication and enthusiasm from the teachers, I would certainly not be where I am today in terms of my studies. Starting out as an unmotivated individual with lack of faith in myself or the grades I was capable of, I have come a long way and have grown into a committed individual. As a whole, I wouldn't change any of my experiences for the world, as they have made me the person I am today.

When life is dragging you back with difficulties, it means it's going to launch you into something great. So focus, and keep aiming.







Being a Scholar has given me so many opportunities, I am extremely glad I went for it and don't regret it."

Cycling Terms

With part of the Tour de France held in England last year, this time we get up to speed with some cycling terms.

Aero bars: chocolates/extension of the handlebars usually allowing the rider to rest his elbows and benefit from improved aerodynamics.

Blow up: explode maybe but really a rider who has gone into oxygen debt and loses the ability to maintain pace.

Brain bucket: collection of intelligence/cycling helmet.

Breakaway: more chocolate or when a small group of riders or an individual have successfully opened a gap ahead of the peloton.

Broom Wagon: transport for witches/support vehicle following a group of cyclists that may carry equipment, food, rider luggage or mechanics.

Chain gang: USA prisoners perhaps but really a group of cyclists cycling in a close knit formation akin to a road race, normally for the purposes of training.

Crank arm: upper body exercise/one of the two arms of a crank set. Each arm connects a pedal to the bottom bracket.

Crank Set: turning devices/the bicycle drive chain assembly that converts the rider's pedalling action to rotating motion.

Danseuse: Moulin Rouge perhaps but really riding out of the saddle, standing up and rocking side to side for leverage.

Derailleur: train crash/device to change gears.

Domestique: housemaid/rider whose job it is to support and work for other riders in their team.

Etape: some technological communication maybe or a stage of a race.

Lanterne rouge: red lantern/French for "red lantern", as found at the end of a railway train, and the name given to the rider placed last in a race.

Flamme rouge: french flame perhaps/a red flag displayed with one kilometre remaining from the finish line of a race. Usually suspended over the road.

Granny gear: M&S cardigan or the lowest gear ratio on a multi-speed bicycle.

Puncheur: maybe a French boxer but really a type of rider who specialises in rolling terrain with short but steep climbs.

Squirrel: grey pest/a cyclist who has a tendency to swerve unexpectedly and maintain inconsistent speed.

Stage: not for daughters or one part of a multi-day race.

Ticket collector: rail employee/a rider that sits at the back of a breakaway but doesn't take the lead. Thus the rider gets a free ride similar to a ticket collector on a train.

Yellow Jersey: Brazil supporter/worn by the rider who is leading in the general classification in the Tour de France.

Green Jersey: Ireland supporter/worn by the leader of the points classification on intermediate sprints and at each stage.

White Jersey: England supporter/worn by the best young rider under 25 in general individual time classification.

Red Polka Dot Jersey: Croatia supporter/worn by the best climber at the top of any classified slope.

Introduction to Croquet

Those who already play croquet will know what a delightful game it is and what a fine sport it can be for those with a more competitive nature. Enfield Croquet Club, which has its own lawns in Bush Hill Park, offers excellent facilities for those who wish to give it a go.

Anyone who has never played before will no doubt be asking why croquet? And the answer is because it's good fun and a sociable ball game for people of all ages played in a friendly atmosphere. It is also one of the few sports where guys and girls, or ladies and gentlemen if you prefer, can and do compete on an equal basis thanks to the handicap system deployed in croquet.

What skills are required in a game of croquet? Well, in essence, just the ability to be able to stand still and to hit a ball with a mallet, ideally with a reasonable degree of accuracy. This is a relatively simple talent that most people can acquire with practice. At its very highest levels you might compare it to the accuracy required for snooker or the putting play in golf. On the tactical side comparisons with the complexities of a cricket or a chess match wouldn't be unreasonable. Combine these with a game played on a decent grass surface and you have the basic concept. Croquet is as competitive and/or social as you would wish it to be and our Club caters for both, with some individuals who only play socially and others who partake in both internal and external competitions at the highest levels.

What you don't require is strength, stamina or the ability to run around. Nor do you require fast reflexes or the ability to hit a moving target as you do in so many other sports. You don't even need a competitive edge to play for fun, but it certainly helps if you want to win more often than you lose.

There are two principal variations of croquet currently played in the UK, differing in the scoring systems and order of shots. Both are played through obstacles called hoops and employ the same course layout. Croquet can be played in back gardens or any flat piece of ground and may be adapted to smaller than standard playing courts but it is so much better when played on a decent full sized surface. The good news then is that the Club plays on

Folly Arch, Little Heath

A folly is normally thought of as a structure or something built with no practical purpose or use and it is often thought that this was the case with Folly Arch. However on the lands known as Gobions behind the arch there once stood a very large house and very splendid gardens, also known as Gobions.

The main entrance to the house was sited at the lower end of Swanley Bar Lane on the Hatfield Road. Folly Arch, however, was an entrance via a tree lined pathway to the fabulous gardens of Gobions. These were known as the pleasure gardens and included a lake, a canal, a bowling green and a woodland temple.

The existing Folly Arch is now the only remaining part of the grand Gobions estate and was built c1754 on the orders of the owner Sir Jeremy Sambrook. The large brick built archway is flanked by two crenelated three storey towers and is now a grade II listed building. A lot of the mortar between the brickwork has been extensively repaired where, over time, people have scraped it away looking for treasure. It was widely rumoured that when it was built a Queen Anne farthing was placed under every brick. However none have ever been located and it is now believed to be nothing more than a local myth.

Folly Arch forms the logo for Little Heath School and is situated at the junction of Hawkshead Road and Swanley Bar Lane.

Buildings of Interest

This is the fourth in a series of articles about buildings of interest in Potters Bar.

The Tudor House, Billy Lows Lane, Potters Bar

The house is a one and a half storey mock Tudor building with a steep gabled roof and rear decorated chimney located on the corner of Darkes Lane and Billy Lows Lane in Potters Bar.

It was designed in the mid 1920s for the Olympia Ideal Home Exhibition of 1926. The building was purchased after the Exhibition for re-erection on the current site. Similar designs were used for the Darkes Lane shops to provide a continuity of design. It is significant as it has strong design of the mock Tudor style and retains most of its original features. Due to its corner position it makes a significant contribution to the local landscape.

At one time the Council planned to list the house but one owner had added a badly designed extension which prevented this from happening. There were also plans to make Darkes Lane a shopping precinct and use the area where the house stands as a car park.

For anybody interested in the method of construction of the building, they can visit the Hertsmere website to look at the list

of locally important buildings in Hertsmere.

Working in the Community - Estate Agent


Teresa Perry's interest in estate agency developed from when she bought her own property. At the time she was working for a local council but, needing more income to cover the mortgage, she applied for a part-time evening job with an estate agent in Cuffley. The work began with phoning clients, but as Teresa learnt more about the business, she was invited to increase her hours until, only one year later, she left the council job and worked full-time at the agency.

After 28 years, and now in her own agency, Teresa still finds the work very rewarding. Every day is different, and with the variety of jobs in both sales and lettings, she is never bored. It is hard work entailing long hours, often working at weekends, and with disappointments if a sale falls through, and frustrations if a repair is delayed on a rented property, usually due to the tradesmen waiting for parts to come into the wholesalers.

A lot of the work now is internet-based or by email rather than by phone-outs or personal contact. Photos are the key elements in people's search for properties but these don't give the whole story, whereas in a phone call the agent can register exactly what the client needs, and notify them of potential properties. Happily, Teresa finds that people in Potters Bar are more forward in talking to the agent about their needs.

In the last 10–15 years agents are doing more in lettings, particularly since councils have sold housing stocks to tenants. This generates more income for letting agents, and the relationship with landlords is longer. Teresa believes there is a good market for families and couples renting in Potters Bar, with fewer short-term tenancies.

Lettings is different to sales as a rented place is more often temporary and therefore quicker to process. It becomes more



complex if the property is also managed by the agent who is then responsible for repairs and knowing and engaging reliable tradesmen. When a sale is agreed the agent must be vigilant about what is going on in all parts of the chain by maintaining contact with solicitors, mortgage brokers and other estate agents, and reporting to the client. Some agents prefer to deal with lettings rather than sales, and vice versa.

For Teresa, the best part of her job is dealing with people, and particularly in person. Even in emails she will try to deliver a personal service. She says, 'You have to like people if you want to be a successful estate agent.'





Welwyn Hatfield Local Plan - 12,500 homes needed by 2031

The Local Plan will shape the future of development in our towns and villages between now and 2031 — new homes, new jobs and business premises, open spaces and community facilities for people to use, and infrastructure such as roads, schools and healthcare. Welwyn Hatfield Borough Council believe that this will be necessary to support the growth of Welwyn Hatfield and a vibrant local economy.

The Strategic Housing Market Assessment (SHMA) is required by the National Planning Policy Framework to objectively assess how many and what types of homes will be needed in the borough.

The key headline from the SHMA is an objectively assessed need for the provision of some 625 new homes per year, which is 12,500 new homes over the 2011–2031 period. It has also identified the need for an additional 620 specialist bed-spaces in care accommodation.

Starting in January 2015, until 19th March, everyone in the borough will have the opportunity to comment on the draft Local Plan. They can do so by registering with the Welwyn Hatfield Consultation Portal.

Christmas Lights

For the past few years Potters Bar has benefitted from the provision of Christmas lights in Darkes Lane and the High Street, under the auspices of John Godfrey and David Cox. Both John and David are now retiring from this responsibility and local residents owe them a great debt of gratitude. They have worked tirelessly, giving up considerable amounts of time in testing the lights and assisting with the loading of the lights onto cherry pickers. This year David was out until the early hours helping the team to erect the lights.

John would particularly like the lights to continue, but the cost involved in storing, testing, erection and dismantling is substantial. In recent years John has had to go cap in hand to both Local and County Councillors to seek funding from their reduced budgets. Unfortunately the lights are now ageing, with some not working at all, and many need extensive repair work. This will obviously add to costs, making the future of the lights problematic.

However John believes that Councillors support the view that the Christmas lights are not only good for community spirit in the town but complement other things that go on at Christmas; church and school carol concerts, Rotary sleigh, nativity plays, etc.

John suggests that the way forward is for the ward Councillors and the two County Councillors to talk to David and himself with the objective of convincing the County Council to repair light columns and to allocate funding to pay a festive lighting firm to supply and erect the lights in Potters Bar every year on a properly contracted basis.

John would like to thank David Cox for his help and advice and also Councillors Eddie Roach, John Usher, John Donne, Penny Swallow, Ruth Lyons and County Councillor Peter Knell and Leader of the Council Morris Bright and Hertsmere and County Officers for their support over the years.

Hedgerow Destruction

Considerable concern has been expressed by local residents regarding the works carried out during January in the field formerly known as Lady Elizabeth Byng playing field, near the footpath connecting Cherry Tree Lane and Sunnybank Road.

The field used to be leased by Hertsmere Council from the Wrotham Park Estate, but the lease was not renewed in 2005 as it was felt to be unsuitable for continued use as a children's play area.

The works have resulted in the destruction of what is believed to be an ancient hedgerow, home to nesting birds and other wildlife. In recent years the land has been left to grow wild, but was crossed by a casual footpath used by local residents, particularly dog-walkers. A new fence has now been erected, preventing such access.

This matter has been brought to the attention of the Hertsmere Planning Enforcement Officer by the Potters Bar Society who are also particularly anxious to ensure that two trees with preservation orders are not touched.

At the time of going to print it is understood that the Enforcement Officer has issued a Planning Contravention Notice to the landowners seeking clarification, from which it will be determined if a breach of planning control has occurred.





St Mary's Church is 100 years old in 2015 - celebrating the past and looking to the future



Just over one hundred years ago, on 15th June 1914, before the outbreak of the First World War, the granddaughter of Queen Victoria, Princess Marie Louise of Schleswig Holstein, visited Potters Bar for a ceremony to lay the foundation stone of the new church of St Mary the

Virgin and All Saints in The Walk. At a time when the town still had the character of a large village, with fields stretching down The Walk, the building of a grand church with a large seating capacity was about to commence. It was an ambitious project. Within two months, the country would find itself at war.

This church would replace St John's Church which had stood since 1835 where the town's War Memorial is now situated in the High Street. Due to the financial constraints brought on by the First World War, the "new" church of St Mary's would remain unfinished until July 1967 when the more modern West End was consecrated.
