Following the report in the summer issue regarding the old fish shop in Cranborne Parade, local resident Maureen Briggs bas been in contact with an account of ber memories. She recalls that her mum and dad moved to Potters Bar in 1938, when she herself was just one year old. As she grew up, ber parents would often send ber to get fish and chips from the shop, particularly on a Friday night. It was then owned by local residents Rita and Dennis. whose surname Maureen cannot recall. Maureen says it was a great shop, selling not only fried fish but wet fish and shellfish as well.

She has always missed the shop and others which were invariably present in most shopping parades. Maureen talks about a chemist, a combined wool shop and post office, a grocer, greengrocer and a butcher. The land currently occupied by offices was green belt.

Maureen reveals that her parents paid just £300 for their house in Auckland Road and she would dearly like to see the return of the fish shop.

A butcher, a baker and a candlestick maker - all in **Cranborne Parade in the 1950s**

My friend believes that the fish and chip shop was owned by a Mike Ashton, who had a son John. The shop had a grey marble slab at the front from which they sold the wet fish. The main counter towards the rear was also grey marble and in those days around head height. The newspapers used to wrap the fish in were left in string-tied bundles by the front door by local residents - pre EU and Health and Safety and an early example of recycling. You could buy a bag of batter scrapings from the bottom of the fryer for a penny, we seem to remember. I thought the shop was taken over by Hammersleys who are now in Brookman's Park after also being in Darkes Lane but I may be wrong in this. I think a bag of chips cost four old pennies (12 old pennies – a shilling – equals 5p today and if you had a shilling as a child in those days you were rich).

The other shops included a baker, where you could buy crumbs and stale buns, a butcher (Manor Farm?), a hardware shop, a green-grocer and general grocer (Walton, Hassell and Port), a chemist, and a Post Office that sold toys and which is still there, of course. There was also a haberdashery (Catherine Howard) and, in what is now the car park of the Strafford Arms, an off-licence where I used to buy a bag of crisps with a twist of salt on the way home from cubs at King Charles the Martyr church on a Monday evening.

So Cranborne Parade could provide all your everyday household needs without having to go to Darkes Lane on the bus or walking - not many families had cars in those days.

We'd be interested to hear other residents' recollections and to see if they conform to ours.

Working in the Community - Vicar

When Canon Michael Burns first put on his dog collar it felt very strange, both scary and exciting, but he found people were more willing to approach him.

Although his parents weren't churchgoers, Michael was baptised in the Church of England, and was educated at Christ's Hospital (Blue Coat) School in Sussex. He attended chapel and was confirmed, and around the age of 16 or 17 he wondered whether he was called to go into the church. After A Levels and about a year working in a Berlin children's home, Michael began to study theology at King's College London and Chichester Theological College. The training over four years included learning New Testament Greek, studying the Bible, church history, speech training, music, preaching, and meeting people in different contexts, such as prison and hospital.

Michael was ordained in 1977 and worked in Shropshire, Stevenage, Epsom (as Vicar of Tattenham Corner), and Milton Keynes before coming to King Charles the Martyr in 2000. Here, his 'boss' is the Bishop of Hertford with whom he has a regular appraisal every two years, and he is supported by the Church Council, two of whom are Church Wardens who are officers of the Bishop. He is provided with a house, which includes an office, and he receives a stipend from the congregation's contributions to the diocese common fund. Fees paid for weddings and funerals also go towards his stipend.

From 2011 to 2016 Michael served as the unpaid Area Dean of Barnet, supporting 17 parishes, appointing new clergy, inspecting churches, and keeping in touch. In 2013 the Bishop of St Albans made him an honorary Canon of St Albans. This was by way of a thank you for the work he has done in the parish and deanery, and allows him to support the work of the cathedral and create communication between it and the churches. It also entitles him to sit in a specific stall in the cathedral.

Michael has to retire by 70 but cannot live in Potters Bar. This he regrets as he is very fond of the people and the area. He finds it a great privilege being part of a community. In 2002 he was involved in the aftermath of the Potters Bar rail crash, helping and supporting the families of the victims, as well as working with the British Transport Police welfare officer, and

Science goes with a bang at Oakmere School

On Monday 4th July the prestigious Royal Institution visited Oakmere Primary School in Potters Bar for a series of exciting science shows.

Martin Coath, a scientist from the Royal Institution, wowed the children with a special show all about the energy hidden within everyday food items. Jelly Babies were turned into fireworks, flour into a fireball, and coke was mixed with Mentos for an explosive result.

After school over one hundred parents, siblings, and friends attended a second exhibition, this time focussing on the power of electricity. A gherkin was turned into a light bulb, light was bent round corners in water, and one of Sir Humphrey Davy's earliest experiments with electrically powered light was recreated.

Science Co-ordinator, Ian Goldsworthy: "The Royal Institution has been educating children and adults about the wonders of science since 1799, so to be able to welcome them to Oakmere was very special. It was fantastic that we were able to invite so many members of the Oakmere community to attend the afterschool event and spread the excitement of science amongst the whole family."

Tributes paid at Zeppelin crash centennial event



Hundreds gathered in Potters Bar on 1st October at the spot where a German Zeppelin came to earth, exactly 100 years on from the fatal incident.

In a touching tribute the Mayor of Hertsmere, Councillor Pete Rutledge, and Colonel Hermann Hanke, the German Air Attaché, shook hands over a wreath laid in honour of the lost airmen, as the haunting sounds of a bugle played the Last Post. They were watched by a large crowd who gathered, despite heavy rain, to pay their respects in Oakmere Park where the doomed ship crashed.



More than 750 people flocked throughout the day to an outdoor film screening and exhibition about the Luftschiffe 31 (L31) Zeppelin, organised by Hertsmere Borough Council. On display were fragments of the airship removed from the

crash-site, and photos, as well as a replica Sopwith Pup, a one-seater plane used during World War One, and a bell shelter, donated by a local resident and used as a lookout post during the World Wars.

Mayor Cllr Rutledge said: "It was inspiring to see the number of people who came on Saturday, and really moving to stand where the Zeppelin landed, listening to the Last Post which had been played a century before during the funeral of the

airmen.Thank you to everyone who gave up their time and energy to make Saturday's event happen, especially the volunteers from the Potters Bar Museum, the Battlefields Trust and the Great War Society, and members of the 1372 Elstree and Borehamwood Squadron Air Cadets band who performed on the day.

Obviously these events took place 100 years ago, so are no longer part of living memory, but their significance lives on. The turnout at the weekend is testimony to the great interest there is in the role local people played during both World Wars. I'm delighted a bell shelter, used as a lookout post during the World Wars, will be restored and become a permanent feature in the park, thereby serving as a lasting reminder of Potters Bar's wartime history."

All 19 men on board were killed after the L31 was shot down by 2nd Lt Wulstan Joseph Tempest on 1 October 1916. Among the casualties was Heinrich Mathy, who was Germany's most successful air raid commander.

At the time, the downing of the airship captured the public imagination and was the subject of a large number of posters, articles and souvenir postcards. Second Lt Tempest received a Distinguished Service Order medal for his actions.

Funding for the event and the restoration of the bell shelter has been received from the Heritage Lottery. A permanent display of Zeppelin remains and memorabilia is available at Potters Bar Museum. Zeppelin Raid - night of 2nd/3rdSeptember 1916

On the evening of Saturday the 2nd of September 1916 Germany launched the largest air raid of the Great War using a total of 16 airships. These comprised 14 aluminium-framed Zeppelins operated by the German Navy and 2 plywood-framed Schütte-Lanz craft operated by the German Army. They headed out across the North Sea to cross the English coast over East Anglia, from where they then headed for targets in the North, the Eastern counties and London.

By mid 1916 England's defences against these air raids had been considerably strengthened since the first big raid a year earlier. Searchlights and anti-aircraft batteries now ringed London; the Royal Flying Corps was flying regular patrols above 10,000 feet and their aircraft were equipped with a recently developed ammunition for their Lewis guns – a mixture of three types of rounds designed specifically to puncture an airship's gas bags and then to ignite the released hydrogen gas.

The first of the airships heading for London that night, a German Army Schütte-Lanz airship, the SL-11, commanded by Wilhelm Schramm, arrived over St Albans at ten minutes past one in the morning of Sunday September 3rd. Schramm dropped bombs on the northern suburbs of London, and while heading further south his airship was picked up by the searchlights at Finsbury Park and Victoria Park. Turning back to the north over Tottenham and Enfield, the SL-11 was spotted by Second Lieutenant William Leefe Robinson in his BE2c biplane. Leefe Robinson pursued and engaged the SL-11 and eventually with his third drum of ammunition succeeded in setting it on fire.

The descent of the blazing SL-11 from a height of two miles to a field at Cuffley was not only seen by many Londoners, but also by the Navy Zeppelins then making their approach. The L-16, commanded by Erich Sommerfeld was the nearest to the SL-11 when it burst into flames, and was seen by one of the RFC pilots who had been chasing SL-11. Sommerfeld headed off to the north, to escape the glow from SL-11 before the planes could arrive at his position. To speed this escape he jettisoned his bomb load as the L-16 was passing over Essendon, and though many of the bombs fell on open land, others caused considerable damage to the church, and other buildings nearby. Outside one of these houses two daughters of the village blacksmith were mortally wounded.

Later that day thousands of sight-seers flocked to Cuffley hoping to see the wreckage of SL-11 which was quickly removed by the authorities. On Monday, the newspapers carried extensive reports which focussed largely on the shooting down of the SL-11 – a victory to be contrasted against the grim news from the battlefields of the Somme. "A Great Air Raid. One Zeppelin Destroyed. Wonderful Spectacle in London. Slight Casualties"



was the heading to the leading article in The Times. That evening an inquest into the deaths of the 16 crew of SL-11 was held at the Plough Inn, Cuffley a short distance from the crash site. The coroner announced that the War Office had decided to give them

a military funeral at the nearest cemetery and this took place two

days later at Potters Bar cemetery.

On Tuesday 5th, the country's delight in this first shooting down of a German airship on English soil was heightened when the King awarded the Victoria Cross to Leefe Robinson. Also that day the inquest was held into the deaths of the sisters from Essendon, Frances and Eleanor Bamford, and this was reported the next day in *The Times*. They were laid to rest in Essendon churchyard on the 6th September.

The bomb that hit the church came down on the flat roof of the vestry, flattening it, wrecking the organ, making a huge hole in the south wall of the chancel and shattering the roof above the altar. The east window was severely damaged, as were other windows in the church, but the nave, aisles and tower all withstood the blast. The church clock stopped at 23 minutes past two. Behind the rubble-strewn altar, the picture of *"The Last Supper"* was unharmed. Among the treasures destroyed in the vestry were the Baskerville Bible, presented to the church in 1791 by the Marquess of Salisbury, the remains of the old pulpit made in 1778, a table and two Chippendale chairs. The contents of the safe including the registers and church plate were undamaged.

The church insurance had been reviewed a short time before and the extra "war time" premium was paid as a personal gift from the Churchwarden at the time, George White, a local farmer. His generosity enabled the repairs to be undertaken quickly. The ruined parts of the church were restored close to their original state. Four stained glass windows were replaced by their original makers using the drawings kept from the 1883 rebuilding of the church, and the Willis organ was rebuilt. A stone set in the south wall of the vestry commemorates the reopening of the restored areas just one year later on Sunday 2nd September 1917.

A special centenary remembrance service, attended by relatives of the Bamford sisters and George White was held on the 3rd September this year outside the restored vestry and in the churchyard at Essendon. Also in attendance was the granddaughter of a member of the Montgomeryshire Yeomanry who were sent to guard the Zeppelin that had been shot down at Cuffley.

After the Zeppelin Crash of 1916

After the enormity of the Zeppelin crash, The Great War slowly ground to an end. It wasn't, however, the end of the matter.

Mr. Joyce, a plumber of Southgate Road, fashioned a crucifix from the Zeppelin framework which he presented to the vicar of St Mary's. This still stands on the altar in All Souls Chapel in the church as a reminder of the suffering during both world wars.

In 1926 the widow of the Zeppelin commander, Frau Hertha Mathy, visited her husband's grave but was disappointed at the neglect and segregation by a fence from the graves of Potters Bar residents. On departure she complained to the German Ambassador about conditions and soon new headstones were erected and the area tidied up. However it was once again left to run wild until in 1930 members of the Toc H society, a charity formed after the First World War, decided to clean it up. This received some publicity in the press and on Armistice Day 1931 a member of Toc H went to the cemetery to lay a wreath and found the German Ambassador doing the same thing. After some discussion it was agreed an annual ceremony would take place to help international relations. It had the opposite effect.

By 1933 the Nazis were in power in Germany and, at that year's



ceremony, a member of the German party gave the Nazi salute beside the graves. The vicar conducting the ceremony stopped, refusing to go on with that or future ceremonies. The Germans were appalled at his reaction and, in the climate of appeasement that existed at the time, the vicar had to allow the services to continue. He took no further part in any of them. In the following years various members of the Nazi hierarchy came to Potters Bar, the last being in February 1939. By then von Ribbentrop was the new German Ambassador and, arriving in full uniform in his official Mercedes bearing a swastika flag, ignored the parking restrictions and pulled up outside a cottage adjoining the cemetery. The lady who lived there was having none of it and dashed out waving a broom and told him to 'clear orf'! Von Ribbentrop, who was already late for the ceremony, climbed back into the car and hastily parked elsewhere.

Eventually in 1961 the German government decided to exhume the bodies of all the Zeppelin crew and relocate them to a newly created war grave at Cannock Chase, thus marking the end of a saga that was played out in Potters Bar over 45 years.

Falls prevention

Every 6 seconds in the UK, an older person will have a fall. Every 30 seconds an older person has a fall serious enough to call an ambulance. In the time it takes to soft boil an egg, an older person in the UK will have a fracture that could be prevented by physiotherapy. Someone in the UK dies of a hip fracture every hour caused by a fall.

Startling statistics and for every statistic there is pain, suffering and the risk of depression and social isolation - and a financial cost. Falls cost the NHS £1.8 billion every year.

The irony is that most of these falls and the pain and suffering caused, plus the financial cost, can be prevented.

Firstly we must recognise our own risk of falling. I suspect when you read 'older person' you assumed 70/80 years of age. Well, data from Saga shows that people in their 50's severely underestimate their risk of falling with 7% thinking they will fall in the next year when 13% have already done so in the previous 12 months!

And once you have fallen once, you significantly increase your risk of falling again.

So, what can we do?

Most falls are preventable so it is about taking personal responsibility to reduce your risk, particularly if you have fallen before:

Weight bearing exercise and physical activity for 30 minutes five

times a week will improve your balance, muscle strength and bone strength.

Check with your doctor/pharmacist if you are taking any medications which seem to make you dizzy.

Get your eye sight checked once a year and be careful with alcohol as it can make you unsteady.

Ask to see a continence nurse or physiotherapist if you find yourself rushing for the loo, particularly at night. Exercises and advice can reduce any symptoms of incontinence and sometimes cure it.

Fall-proof your home and garden – as we age, our homes often do too with worn carpets, clutter building up and maintenance not what it once was.

And lastly, stay safe out and about and use walking aids if necessary.

In this issue, we offer an analysis of the terms used in lawn bowls:

Bias: prejudice/the natural curve built into a bowl, creating an arc from the point of release to the point when it stops.

Blocker: obstruction perhaps or really a bowl positioned on the green such that it would stop an opponent's bowl from reaching a defined point, usually the jack.

Crack an egg: start making breakfast/a description of the weight required to complete an ideal shot.

Bowl: receptacle for breakfast cereal/the ball used for bowls. The side of the bowl that is biased can be identified by the smaller engraved concentric rings seen.

Dead Bowl: broken breakfast receptacle/a bowl are considered dead if it finishes in the ditch or outside the boundary. If, however, it had touched the jack it remains a live bowl even if it is in the ditch.

Matching bowl: similar receptacle or a bowl that sits next to or near an opponent's bowl in the head.

Draw: 0–0 perhaps/a bowl delivered to finish closest to the jack, without the need to move or touch other bowls in the head.

Dead draw: boring 0–0 perhaps/a bowl that becomes the shot bowl (closest to the jack) without touching any other bowl during its delivery.

Dead end: cul-de-sac but really a partially completed end that has to be replayed, usually by reason of the jack going outside the rink.

Ditch: discard something/the area surrounding the green, usually identifiable as a shallow trench at the edges of the green.

Head: the headmaster/refers to the area of the rink where the jack and any live bowls are at rest in a particular end.

Declare the head: sack the headmaster!/an expression advising that the last player to go will not deliver his last bowl. It is called if the player of his team is holding shot, or that there is a significant danger of worsening their position.

Disturb the head: worry the headmaster/Play a bowl with sufficient weight to alter the positions of the bowls and/or the jack in the head.

Dumping: putting the bin out/a bowl delivered above the green so that it bounces on the turf after it leaves the hand. Normally an indication of a poor technique.

Give away the mat: donation following change of kitchen floor covering perhaps/The winner of the toss has the option to play the first bowl, called keeping the mat or letting the opponent bowl first, thus reserving the last bowl of the end to themselves. Thus, to give away the mat.

Keep the mat: don't change the kitchen flooring/the opposite of giving away the mat.

Jack: car accessory/the small white ball that is the target for all the other bowls to be aimed at.

Jack High: car accessory in operation/a comparison of the position of a bowl in relation to the jack.

Skip: child's rope/in a team of 3 or more, the skip is the player who delivers the last bowl. He also has other duties, including directing the head for his teammates and making decisions in co-operation with the opponents in the event of a dispute.

Kitty: young cat/another name for the jack.

Tickle the kitty: caress the young cat/the result of a bowl delivered such that it moves the jack a slight distance.



Purple olio

An update on our Summer Edition

As you know Rotary has been working hard over the last 30 years to rid the world of polio – a terrible disease that can kill or severely disable children. Although cases are down by 99.9% and over 2.5 billion children have been immunised, remote and rural areas are the hardest to reach. It requires at least three years with no new cases being reported in order to declare the world polio free.

Sad News

After more than two years without wild poliovirus in Nigeria, the Government reported in August that two children have been paralysed by the disease in the northern Borno state.

As an immediate priority the Government of Nigeria is collaborating with WHO and other partners of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative to respond urgently and prevent more children from being paralysed. These steps include conducting large-scale immunisation campaigns and strengthening surveillance systems that help catch the virus early. These activities are also being strengthened in neighbouring countries.

World Polio Day

24th October was World Polio Day. Brookmans Park Rotary Club has partnered with Brookmans Park Primary School and the Parish Council and planted 5,000 crocus corms on Bradmore Green and in Gobions Open Space. This is part of a national initiative involving 5 million corms that will flower in February 2017 to brighten up communities across Great Britain and Ireland.






